

MARTHAM, a parish in the Hundred of West Flegg and Union of East and West Flegg, situate about 10 miles north-north-west from Yarmouth. The living is a discharged vicarage in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich, who are appropriators of the rectorial tithes, now leased to Wm. Rising, Esq., and Mrs. Ann Francis. The benefice is enjoyed by the Rev. George Pearse, of Norwich. Roger Gunton, in 1160, gave the church to the prior and convent of Norwich, "for the redemption of his soul." Here is a Free school, founded pursuant to the will of Christopher Amies, who left £110 for that purpose in 1622. This sum, together with several small donations, was laid out in purchasing the school-house and 5 acres 1 rood of land, which was exchanged at the enclosure in 1812 for 7 acres 3 roods 7 poles, now let for £16 15s. a year; which, with the use of the house and garden, is the salary of the master, for teaching about 20 poor children. Also two

charities each for the education of six girls. There are other charitable bequests for the benefit of the poor of the parish; also 78 acres of land, which was awarded at the enclosure in 1812. The church, which is dedicated to St. Mary, is a fine Gothic structure, with nave, chancel, a lofty square tower, and six bells. The Baptists and the Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists have places of worship here. A fair is held here, chiefly for pleasure, on the last Tuesday and Wednesday in July. The parish comprises 1,032 inhabitants, and about 2,280 acres. Thomas Grove, Esq., is lord of the manor, for which he holds a court at Michaelmas; but there are a number of small owners in the parish. The village is large, and delightfully situated on rising ground above the marshes; there are several handsome and well-built houses, with some good shops, which give the village a business-like appearance. Cess is a hamlet in this parish.
